1 | Director's Comments from Harj.

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DIRECTOR CHIMA: Good morning, Commissioners.

3 **COMMISSIONERS:** Good morning.

DIRECTOR CHIMA: A, I have a rather short report this month since we're only a couple of months into the Through mid-September, our total Lottery sales fiscal year. are just over \$1.7 billion. Scratchers are coming in just shy of our goals through the summer, but typically, the summer is our slowest time of year. Since the start of the new fiscal year, Powerball's jackpot has only reached \$212 million, which is why our sales are so soft. You may recall last year we had some discussions about the groundbreaking jackpots that we had over the last fiscal year. On a more positive note, we were able to make a new multi-millionaire, \$44 million to be exact, in Dana Point back in August. Millions did roll up to \$800 million a few weeks ago, and while that jackpot winner was in Texas, we do estimate that approximately \$66.8 million went to public schools as a result of that sequence, which started back in June. I'm sure you've noticed in this table here that sales for our jackpot games are lower than they were last year at this This is really ultimately due to the really different jackpots that we have this year versus the ones last year. At this time last year, jackpot fever was in full effect. Powerball's jackpot rolled to \$785 million; Mega Millions

1 had already exceeded \$1.5 billion; and SuperLotto Plus had a 2 high of \$82 million, which are all very high jackpots for 3 their respective games, especially compared to the levels 4 that I just mentioned to you that we've had so far this 5 year. Lastly, the sales for the Daily Games and Hot Spot are coming in as expected. Over the first two months of the 6 fiscal year, our estimated contributions to Education 7 8 totaled \$282 million, and while we're not yet hitting our 9 goals, we do anticipate that we'll see that increase. 10 Primarily, we're not hitting goal right now as a result of the low jackpots that we just mentioned. You may remember 11 12 back to the June meeting, we had increased our sales and profit goals from the jackpot games for the past year based 13 14 on the rollover luck that we had last year. 15 But since we can't really predict with any certainty when 16 we'll have high jackpots, the monthly goals for these games 17 are set as just a monthly average. And as the year progresses, and we have more time for jackpots to roll 18 19 higher, we do expect that our profits will be closer to the 20 profit goals. And that actually concludes my report, unless 21 you have any questions. 22 CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Wonderful, thank you. 23 Are there any questions? Commissioner -- oh. 24 COMMISSIONER MILLS: Thanks, Director. Thank you

for that report. I know that the jackpot games are really

reliant on the jackpot sizes-led sales, but I was wondering if you could talk a little bit about, are there any other strategies or adjustments to our marketing strategies that we're making during periods where the jackpots aren't in our favor? Are there other adjustments that we can or are making during those periods?

DIRECTOR CHIMA: Sure. I can start to address that, and then I'm going to ask Sharon Allen to give us an answer (inaudible), but I do know that we, as you all know and have heard over the past few years, we've worked on our Scratchers Repositioning Plan and are really working to get that in place. I'm going to turn it over to Sharon because I don't know if I can mention the next thing just yet.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: Okay. I think we've talked it about it a little bit.

DIRECTOR CHIMA: Okav.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: But in terms of one of the things, you know, we want to make sure that we're constantly top of mind with our regular jackpot players, and we do that on an ongoing basis, reminding them about the jackpots through our social media, our email outlets. At our retail point of sale, we have extensive promotion, either through those window jackpot signs, and we are, through the IGT Contract, we are ordering additional signs, as I think Jim has talked about their importance as part of the Business

1	Plan. Those window signs do a tremendous lift for us for					
2	jackpots but also for Scratchers, so getting more signs,					
3	more presence at retail as well, and then also looking at					
4	ways that we can evolve the games. And there's more to come					
5	on that in the future. One more thing that's very important					
6	for us is we have this window where the jackpots get a					
7	little bit larger but not so large that everybody's talking					
8	about it, where we run an advertising effort called Jackpot					
9	Alerts to help give awareness, and so that helps fuel it,					
10	and then once it's in the zeitgeist, we pull back on the					
11	paid advertising because the organic buzz just takes it on					
12	its own. So, we're starting to get into threshold again					
13	with that, where we start advertising, and we'll continue to					
14	do that until it hopefully continues to roll.					
15	COMMISSIONER MILLS: Great. That's super-helpful.					
16	Thank you.

Action Items. Our first Action Item is Investment Policy
and Investment Strategy, Action Item #8a. Nick?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR BUCHEN: Thank you. Good morning.

COMMISSIONERS: Good morning.

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR BUCHEN: All right. I'm here today to request your approval for the Lottery's Investment Policy and Investment Strategy, and these two items work together to ensure sufficient cash flow to make scheduled payments to certain Lottery prizewinners. And these recurring payments are for our jackpot winners who choose the annuity payout option instead of a lump-sum payment for SuperLotto Plus, Mega Millions, and Powerball Jackpot winners and the top prizewinners of Scratchers games that offer an annuity payout option. The Lottery's Investment Policy requires both our investment strategy and policy to be reviewed and approved by the Commission annually. Our Investment Policy lays out the requirements of our Investment Program, which revolve around timeliness of payments to our annuity prizewinners and safety of principal. The policy includes permitted investment categories and places limits on certain securities to promote diversification and to reduce risk. The Investment Policy also includes requirements pertaining to changes in credit ratings, as well as the reinvestment of securities within our portfolio in certain situations. The Lottery's

Investment Policy requires our review annually to ensure that its guidelines remain consistent with current principles and standards for their investment of funds managed by a public entity. We review all investments within the Lottery's portfolio to verify that each continues to comply with the provisions of our Investment Policy. I'm certifying today that we've reviewed and verified all elements of the Lottery's Investment Policy, and we are recommending no changes. And the Lottery's Investment Policy provides the framework for the particular investment strategy that we employ, which is the second part of this agenda item.

The Lottery's Investment Strategy focuses on two main areas, Activity and Maintenance. The Investment Activity ensures sufficient cash flow to make scheduled payments to our top prizewinners who choose the annuity payout option. And the other aspect our of strategy is maintenance of our investment portfolio, which includes ongoing monitoring and mitigation of potential investment risk. Our current Investment Strategy, which has remained unchanged for more than 14 years, is to purchase United States Treasury Bonds for new annuity prizewinners, and we do this because these investments are backed by a repayment pledge from the United States government, which means they are essentially risk-free. Under our Investment Strategy,

we time the maturity of our investments with the scheduled payments of the annuity prizes. Our Investment Strategy continues to focus on keeping our investment portfolio safe and secure. And the primary function of both our Investment Policy and Strategy is to ensure the investments yield only what is needed for the scheduled annuity payments, and that's why we typically acquire such conservative securities. However, the Investment Policy allows us to look for opportunities to leverage other investment types with more risk to ultimately provide more funding to Education when it clearly makes sense for us to do so. We recommend that the Commission approve the Lottery's existing Investment Policy and Strategy, and I'm happy to answer any questions.

CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Thank you. Are there any questions or comments from the Commissioners?

COMMISSIONER ALVIDREZ: Thank you so much for this presentation, Nick. I know that I'd asked a couple of questions during our briefing, so I won't repeat those because you responded very well and gave me a degree of comfort in the responses to the questions. But I would like to ask again, for the sake of public record, about the consulting firm that we use or will need to use as it relates to the decline in the investment and how we make sure that we are tracking to maximize our investment to

1 Public Education. 2 DEPUTY DIRECTOR BUCHEN: Sure. So, I'll explain 3 first, we use for just the everyday purchases of the United 4 States Treasury Bonds, essentially, the State Treasurer's 5 Office acts as our contractor, and we purchase through them. So, the Investment Policy actually has a similar kind of 6 7 requirement for contracting with another entity to purchase securities, and it has to be a competitive process similar 8 9 to what the Treasurer does before they purchase the bonds. 10 So, it ensures that we would strike the appropriate balance between risk and return on investment if we chose to do so. 11 12 COMMISSIONER ALVIDREZ: Thank you. CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: 13 Are there any 14 additional questions? 15 COMMISSIONER MILLS: Just a question, please. 16 are we using a consultant or we're using Treasurer's Office? DEPUTY DIRECTOR BUCHEN: We're using the 17 Treasurer's Office. What I alluded to, if the broader 18 19 economic conditions were such that it would make sense for 20 us to sell off a portion of our United States Treasury Bonds 21 into higher risk but higher-yielding other types of 22 securities, we would do a competitive process to consult 23 with a firm to do that. 24 COMMISSIONER MILLS: Okay. I see. And then we

would have to go out to RFP to engage one?

1	DEPUTY DIRECTOR BUCHEN: Exactly.					
2	COMMISSIONER MILLS: We do not currently have a					
3	consultant engaged.					
4	DEPUTY DIRECTOR BUCHEN: Correct.					
5	COMMISSIONER MILLS: Okay, thank you.					
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR BUCHEN: Uh-huh.					
7	CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Any other questions?					
8	Does anyone from the public want to address the Commission					
9	at this time regarding Action Item #8a?					
10	COMMISSIONER ALVIDREZ: Just real quick. So, we					
11	have used consultants in the past?					
12	DEPUTY DIRECTOR BUCHEN: Uh-huh.					
13	COMMISSIONER ALVIDREZ: Currently not using					
14	external consultants. What are the thresholds, or what will					
15	be the triggers in which, at which point in that decline					
16	will we determine that we'll need to bring in other					
17	expertise again (inaudible) that process?					
18	DEPUTY DIRECTOR BUCHEN: So, we've done it one					
19	time in the past. When we did it, it was during the Great					
20	Recession. So, the economy had softened to such a point					
21	where it made sense that it was only a matter of time					
22	before it was going to go back up, so, at that point, the					
23	outside consultant, you know, clearly demonstrated that,					
24	yes, it's worth taking a little bit of risk on to get a much					
25	greater return in the future. So, since that time, there					

1 just hasn't been the same kind of broader economic 2 conditions, and it kind of goes back to the primary purpose 3 of our Investment Plan and Policy and Strategy are to just 4 ensure that we have enough to pay the scheduled payments, so 5 although, you know, we could make a little more here and 6 there, it's not worth the risk when there's not like a 7 greater economic condition like the Great Recession. COMMISSIONER ALVIDREZ: And should there be kind 8 of economic concerns because we're -- I think we can all 9 10 acknowledge that we're possibly heading into some more 11 uncertain economic times. Are there flashpoints or 12 benchmarks in which we're, like, uh-oh, the decline and the economy dictate that we need to consider this? I mean, do 13 14 we have some triggers in place, or? 15 **DEPUTY DIRECTOR BUCHEN:** There aren't like 16 automated triggers per se, but certainly, there are enough 17 firms in that space that do this type of work where they would certainly approach us if they felt that we could, you 18 19 know, benefit from such consulting. 20 CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Any other questions? 21 Seeing none, do I have a motion to adopt Action Item #8a? 22 COMMISSIONER MILLS: I'll move to approve. 23 **CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT:** Do I have a second? 24 COMMISSIONER ALVIDREZ: Second. 25 CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Will the Secretary

12	next item is Action Item #8b, Scientific Games, LLC Instant
13	Ticket Printing Contract Extension, with Sharon.
14	DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: Hi. Good morning again.
15	CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Good morning.
16	DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: I'm here to present the
17	next three items, so I'd first like to go to just a general
18	overview of all three and then go into each one, if that's
19	okay, because there's a lot of commonality among all three.
20	And there are currently only three vendors in the entire
21	world that provide the comprehensive, highly specialized
22	printing services that can meet the quality, volume, and
23	security requirements of the Lottery: Scientific Games,
24	Pollard Banknote, and IGT Global Solutions, and the Lottery
25	has contracts with each of them. After a competitive RFP

1 process, these three contracts were first awarded by the 2 Commission in 2013, with an initial term of six years, with 3 options to extend for one three-year term and three one-year 4 In 2019, the Commission approved the three-year 5 extensions for each contract. In 2022, the Commission exercised the first one-year extension, and then last year, 6 the Commission exercised the second extension, taking the contracts through November 30th of this year. All three 8 9 vendors are strategic business partners and have helped the 10 Lottery increase Scratchers sales from approximately \$3.3 billion in Fiscal Year 2014 to over \$6.65 billion in the 11 12 last fiscal year. With the contracts set to expire this 13 November, we're here today to request approval to amend the 14 three contracts to extend for one year and update the 15 pricing for new innovation and price points, as well as to 16 add funds into the contracts. This will ensure 17 uninterrupted Scratchers sales as the Lottery prepares to 18 release a Request for Proposal in the Spring of 2025, and 19 I'd be happy to answer any questions now, or we can get into 20 Item #8b? 21 CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Are there any questions 22 regarding the oral summary for the next three items? 23 Yes, a question. COMMISSIONER MILLS: 24 Sharon, for the first part of the information. So, I think 25 I've asked this before, but since there's only like three

vendors in the world who can meet our requirements, what are the processes and strategies we go through to make sure that we're getting best price on these contracts?

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DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: Well, when we go out to the RFP, it'll be a competitive bid, and we will have that pricing, we also consult with our colleagues in other jurisdictions, and if possible, we can share pricing, but through the competitive RFP process is our best way to do that.

COMMISSIONER MILLS: Okay. Yes, and the comparison with other states seems like that (overlapping).

on a range of issues, and it's a great thing about the Lottery industry is that we can share best practices. We're not competitive. As much as we like to compete with other lotteries, like in Florida, we're not actually, you know, competitive in that sense, and so we can share knowledge and best practices and other guidelines. And you know, when we put the RFP out, if there are other vendors who may feel that they're qualified and meet that, we would welcome that as well.

COMMISSIONER MILLS: Great, thank you.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: Okay. All right. We're ready to go into #8b. This is Scientific Games Instant

Ticket Printing Contract Extension and increase in

expenditure authority. As the primary vendor, Scientific Games, or SG, plays a key role in the Lottery's overall 3 success with Scratchers sales, and in turn, its contributions to Education. SG is responsible for printing a majority of Scratchers for the Lottery, as well as additional responsibilities, such as providing Lotterydedicated staff and extended marketing support. SG is a reliable business partner, providing a unique product and industry-wide insights into Lottery's business. The current authorized expenditure is \$246.6 million. Staff estimates that approximately \$29 million will be available for the 11 12 remainder of the current term to allow for sufficient funding through the current and proposed extension ending in 13 November of 2025. An increase of the expenditure authority by \$19.6 million is recommended. We recommend that the Commission approve an extension of Scientific Games Printing Contract for one year and an increase of the expenditure authority. The new contract will expire November 30th, 2025, 18 19 and have a maximum contract expenditure amount of \$266.2 million. I'd be happy to answer any questions about this 21 item, Scientific Games. 22 CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Do any Commissioners 23 have any questions or comments regarding Action Item #8b? COMMISSIONER MILLS: I have one other question, 25 and it's actually probably going back to the broader

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1 How do you decide what vendor to use for what? 2 How does the work get distributed among these three vendors? 3 **DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN:** Sci Games is the primary 4 vendor, so they do end up printing a majority, and that's 5 from a pricing standpoint, but also, we have a dedicated Scratchers Product Development Team that works with all 6 three vendors and looks for different innovations or what 7 each one has to offer depending on our individual business 8 9 goals. For example, Pollard, which we'll hear about in the 10 next item, they print a lot of our extended-play crosswords 11 because they have a specialty in that. So, it's a mix of what's on the printing schedule, what the offerings are. 12 Some have different licensed properties. 13 It just depends on 14 objectives. We look at all of them and pick the best ones 15 that are going to meet our business needs and our customer's 16 needs in California. 17 COMMISSIONER MILLS: And is the pricing consistent between the three or does it fluctuate? 18 **DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN:** It varies. 19 The pricing 20 for Scientific Games is on a percent of sales, whereas on 21 the two secondary vendors, Pollard and IGT, it's based on a 22 printing amount. 23 COMMISSIONER MILLS: Okay. So, is there also 24 maybe kind of a cost assumption that goes -- or a cost

estimate that goes into decision-making of which one you use

1 | for what?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: Yes, absolutely, looking at the overall mix, like where we think there's going to be sales performance and revenue and the cost to make sure that we're balancing as a total.

COMMISSIONER MILLS: Got it. Okay, thank you.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: With a goal of getting the best product that's going to perform the best.

COMMISSIONER MILLS: Yes, best product, best price, best result.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: All of that, yes.

COMMISSIONER MILLS: Thank you. That was helpful.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: You're welcome.

given for all three, if we kind of back out to the broader summary of all three, you're requesting that all three be granted this last of the one-year extensions. They've all been in place for now 11 years. And I'm going back to what my colleague commented, which is that there are only these three, really, that can provide this level of service for kind of what we do, and they're all due to expire around November of 2025. What is the process for putting these contracts out to bid when the universe is so tight? What's our timeline? I know that they expire in November 2025, so can you back me out to that bid process of when we start

crafting our scope of work, when we put it out to the public?

working on that. The team has been working on it in anticipation for probably the last year, looking at the previous bid, talking to industry colleagues, and things like that, with an anticipated release date in the Spring. We haven't finalized the exact schedule, so I don't want to commit in the public forum yet, but looking at the Spring, well aware of the deadline to bring it to the Commission and get approval so we're in place well before the end of the contracts.

COMMISSIONER ALVIDREZ: And in consultation with our colleagues and other entities, we still have a degree of confidence that there have been no new entrants into the market in the last 11 years?

DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: We are not aware of any at this point. We're constantly looking, and just in talking to other colleagues, nothing's identified, and also, the volume that we produce is not consistent. You know it's not equal to a much smaller state, you know? Texas, Florida, obviously, they're big states, but there are many states that aren't even close to what we do.

COMMISSIONER ALVIDREZ: Thank you.

16	MS. ESTRELLA: Chair Garrison-Engbrecht?					
17	CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Yes. Sharon, you're up					
18	next with Action Item #8c, Pollard Banknote Limited Instant					
19	Ticket Printing Contract Extension.					
20	DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: All right. As one of our					
21	secondary Scratchers printing printers, Pollard plays a key					
22	role in the Lottery's overall success with Scratchers sales					
23	and, in turn, our contributions to Education. The current					
24	maximum authorized contract expenditure is \$116.6 million,					
25	and it's estimated that approximately \$11 million will be					

1	available for the extended term. To allow for sufficient					
2	funding, an increase in funding of \$10.1 million is					
3	recommended. We recommend that the Commission approve this					
4	extension of Pollard's printing contract for one year and an					
5	increase in expenditure authority, taking the contract					
6	through November 30^{th} of 2025 and a maximum contract					
7	expenditure amount of \$126.7 million. Any questions on					
8	Pollard?					
9	CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Are there any questions					
10	regarding Action Item #8c from the Commissioners? Any					
11	public comment or questions on Action Item #8c? Seeing					
12	none, can I have a motion to adopt Action Item #8c?					
13	COMMISSIONER MILLS: Move to approve.					
14	CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Second?					
15	COMMISSIONER RASOULI: Second.					
16	CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Will the Secretary					
17	please call the roll?

2	DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: This is it. All right.					
3	CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Action Item #8d, IGT					
4	Global Solutions Corporation Instant Ticket Printing					
5	Contract Extension.					
6	DEPUTY DIRECTOR ALLEN: All right. As our other					
7	secondary vendor, IGT also plays a very important role in					
8	the Lottery's overall success, with Scratchers sales and, in					
9	turn, our contributions to Education. With approximately					
10	\$13 million of funding remaining, we estimate it will be					
11	sufficient for this one-year extension, so with this one, we					
12	recommend the Commission approve an extension of IGT's					
13	Instant Ticket Printing Contract for one year and through					
14	November 30^{th} of 2025, and the maximum expenditure authority					
15	will remain at \$25 million.					
16	CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Thank you, Sharon. Are					
17	there any questions from the Commissioners? Anyone from the					
18	public who'd like to address the Commission regarding Action					
19	Item #8d? Seeing none, can I have a motion to approve					
20	Action Item #8d, IGT Global Solutions Corporation Instant					
21	Ticket Printing Contract Extension?					
22	COMMISSIONER MILLS: Move to approve.					
23	CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Second?					
24	COMMISSIONER RASOULI: Second.

16	efficient meeting, and I'm just wondering, when we have					
17	meetings like this where there aren't many agenda items,					
18	that that might be an opportunity to bring forward some					
19	informational-type items just to help us continue to learn					
20	and be, you know, good governors and good commissioners.					
21	So, I just wanted to kind of put that out there. I don't					
22	know how my colleagues feel. I know an efficient, short					
23	meeting is always good, but it's also bringing us all					
24	together from all over the State of California, and it					
25	feels like a lost opportunity not to try to use some of that					

1 time in ways that would be helpful for us as Commissioners,
2 so.

DIRECTOR CHIMA: I'll just share that we are working on informational items for the upcoming meeting.

COMMISSIONER MILLS: Excellent.

DIRECTOR CHIMA: For the rest of the fiscal year.

COMMISSIONER MILLS: Great, thank you.

CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: I think also one of the things that we can maybe do over the next few weeks is identify some topics that would be helpful for learning, development, and onboarding for the Commissioners. If that's okay with you --

DIRECTOR CHIMA: Absolutely.

CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: -- maybe we could pull some topics that might be helpful, looking I think through an operational lens, but maybe some also education regarding some of the ongoing work that the organization has been doing, various and past projects I think we've been briefed on over the last year: Mission, Vision, Values, some operational, along with regarding staffing that we've talked about. I know that we've had over the last few Commission meetings approval of additional positions. So, we can talk about some of those topics that we didn't add to the Informational Items for discussion.

DIRECTOR CHIMA: I think that'd be great if you

wanted to put together a short list of maybe the top topics that you'd be interested in, and we'd be happy to have staff put together some presentations for you all.

COMMISSIONER MILLS: And like, for today, because we were all focused on these contracts out of Sharon's -- it just would have been nice to have something maybe, you know, more overarching about like how these contracts impact, you know, the Lottery, you know, thinking about that, too, like tying stuff back to things that we're voting on --

DIRECTOR CHIMA: Okay. Uh-huh.

COMMISSIONER MILLS: -- to just give us more
context in what we're approving.

DIRECTOR CHIMA: Okay. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER MILLS: Uh-huh.

CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: Any other topics for Commissioner discussion? So, right now, (inaudible) has scheduled the next Commission meeting on November 21st, 2024, here in Sacramento. The next item is Action Item #11, Public Discussion. Is there anyone from the public who would like to address the Commission? And then we'll move to Adjournment. Seeing none, we'll move to adjournment. Before we adjourn, I'd like to take a few minutes to recognize someone who's not present today. Commissioner Gregory Ahern recently resigned from this body for personal reasons. We would be remiss to not honor his time serving

1	here on the California Lottery Commission. He was first
2	appointed to the Commission by Governor Jerry Brown more
3	than a decade ago in 2012. He served as Chair for at least
4	half of that tenure. He was a big supporter of the good
5	work that's been done here and across the State for the
6	Lottery and its leadership, and he has always been a
7	steadfast champion for the work that we've done at the
8	California Lottery. On behalf of the Commission and the
9	entire Lottery, we thank Commissioner Ahern for his service
10	and his dedication to serving the State of California and
11	wish him nothing but the best.
12	COMMISSIONER ALVIDREZ: Thank you so much for
13	reading those comments into the record. I think it's
14	especially important since he's not here to receive his
15	flowers from the staff, right, that that is a matter of
16	public record that we acknowledge his stellar service to the
17	Commission. Thank you.
18	CHAIR GARRISON-ENGBRECHT: And we will find a time
19	to celebrate his service to the Lottery Commission and the
20	State of California in the upcoming weeks. And with that,
21	we adjourn today's meeting in his honor. (End of Recording)
