Jackpot Alert! ***\$26 Million Winning Ticket Sold in Los Angeles County***

SACRAMENTO – A SuperLotto Plus® ticket purchased in Los Angeles County hit the \$26 million jackpot Saturday night! The lucky ticket was purchased at the ARCO AM/PM, at 10602 E. Imperial Highway in Norwalk – a business which now earns a bonus of \$130,000 just for selling the winning ticket. The winning numbers were 23, 36, 12, 31, 13 with a mega number of 10.

An additional winning SuperLotto Plus® ticket matching five numbers was sold in Seal Beach (Orange County); that ticket earns a prize of \$36,680.

The California Lottery will not know the identity of the winners until claims are turned in, processed, and verified. The Lottery now provides safe, secure drop boxes for prize claims located at the Lottery's District Offices located throughout the state. About the California Lottery

The California Lottery's mission is to provide supplemental funding to California public schools, including kindergarten and grades 1-12, community colleges, the California State University, the University of California, and other California public educational entities. The funds the Lottery transfers to public education total approximately \$1.8 billion for fiscal year 2018-19, which amounts to a modest percentage of education's overall budget. However, this funding is largely non-discretionary, meaning schools can use this for important, yet unfunded instructional programs they would otherwise not afford. During the same period the Lottery generated almost \$7 billion in sales, more than 95% of which goes back to the community in the form of prize payments, retailer commissions and bonuses, and contributions to education.
