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California Powerball® Jackpot Win in Detail

California and Wisconsin Split First Powerball Jackpot of 2022 - Each Ticket is Worth \$316 Million!

SACRAMENTO – There were two jackpot winners in last night's \$630+ million Powerball drawing. A California ticket shares the prize with another winning ticket in the state of Wisconsin. The jackpot prize amount has been revised to \$632.6 million. Each ticket is now worth \$316.3 million for these lucky lottery players.

The California winning ticket was sold at the 7-Eleven at 6591 Wyndham Drive in Sacramento. It matched all six numbers in the draw (6-14-25-33-46 and the red Powerball number 17). The California Lottery will not know who the winner is until they claim their prize. They will have the option of accepting the Annuitized amount in 30 graduated annual installments or the Cash Option of \$225.1 million. These are **pre-tax** amounts. The retailer will receive a \$1 million bonus just for selling the winning ticket.

This is the second time in a row a winning Powerball jackpot ticket was sold in California! You may remember back in October of 2021, a winning Powerball ticket worth \$699 million was sold in Morro Bay.

With there being two jackpot winners in last night's Powerball draw, here are the latest statistics for the entire rolling sequence.

- The Powerball sequence began at \$20 million on Wednesday, October 6, 2021 and rolled 39 times to an advertised jackpot of \$630 million for last night's draw.
- California's sales for this entire Powerball sequence (comprised of 40 draws including last night's) totaled \$169.7 million.
- The contribution to education from this entire Powerball sequence (the 40 draws) is estimated to be more than \$67.8 million.
- Our Powerball sales for Wednesday's draw at an advertised jackpot of \$630 million totaled \$18.8 million.
- Nearly 85 million Powerball tickets were sold in California for this entire rolling sequence.

- Of these, more than 3.4 million were winning tickets, with a total associated prize value of \$27.2 million excluding the roughly \$316 million jackpot prize won on a ticket sold in California in last night's draw.
- Throughout this entire rolling sequence, there were five separate draws in which winning tickets sold in California matched 5 of 6 (missing only the Powerball number) worth more than \$8.6 million combined.
 - The latest such winning ticket was sold in South Pasadena for last night's draw and is worth just over \$1.3 million. That ticket was purchased at the Chevron at 1400 Mission Street; the retailer will get a \$6,517 bonus for selling this winning ticket.
- Our retailer partners were winners in this entire Powerball sequence as well, earning an
 estimated \$11 million combined for selling Powerball tickets, cashing the associated winning
 tickets, and receiving incentive bonuses for selling tickets worth \$1 million or more.

If someone believes they have a winning ticket over \$599, they will need to complete a California Lottery claim form. Claim forms are available on our website, at all Lottery District Offices, and at any of our more than 23,000 Lottery retailers throughout the state. Winners should sign the back of their ticket in ink, make a copy of the front and back, and put it in a safe place until they can claim their prize. If you've won the Powerball jackpot, you have up to a year from the date of the draw to claim it. You have 180 days from the date of the draw to claim all other Powerball prizes.

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The California Lottery's mission is to provide supplemental funding to California public schools, including kindergarten and grades 1-12, community colleges, the California State University, the University of California, and other California public educational entities. The funds the Lottery transferred to public education totaled more than \$1.8 billion for fiscal year 2020-21, which amounted to a modest percentage of education's overall budget. However, this funding is largely nondiscretionary, meaning schools can use this for important, yet unfunded instructional programs they would otherwise not afford. During the same period, the Lottery generated almost \$8.4 billion in sales, more than 95% of which went back to the community in the form of prize payments, retailer commissions and bonuses, and contributions to education.
