Lottery Players Continue to Win Big – A Ticket Sold in Sacramento Hits \$41 Million SuperLotto Plus® Jackpot!

SACRAMENTO – As California Lottery tickets hit the jackpot for a second time in less than a week, players have a lot to be thankful for. Just this past week, a ticket purchased in Southern California hit the largest jackpot in U.S. Lottery history, and now a gas station in Northern California has sold a SuperLotto Plus® jackpot-winning ticket worth \$41 million.

The winning numbers from last night's draw are 2-5-17-40-46 and Mega Ball 1. The lucky ticket was sold in Sacramento at the Chevron located at 2500 Fulton Avenue. The gas station will get a bonus of \$205,000 just for selling the winning ticket.

The Lottery will not know who the winner is until they come forward to claim the multimillion-dollar prize. SuperLotto Plus winners who match six numbers have 180 days from the date of the draw to claim their prize. If a person believes they have the winning ticket, they'll need to complete a California Lottery claim form. Claim forms are available on our website, at all nine Lottery District Offices, and at any of our more than 23,000 Lottery retail partners throughout the state.

SuperLotto Plus draws happen twice a week on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Tickets are \$1 each, and California players can buy them at more than <u>23,000 places</u> across the state.

The California Lottery's mission is to provide supplemental funding to California public schools, including kindergarten and grades 1-12, community colleges, the California State University, the University of California, and other California public educational entities.
