More Than Two Million Winning Mega Millions® Tickets Sold in CA, but No Jackpot Yet in 2024

SACRAMENTO – Tonight's *Mega Millions* jackpot stands at an estimated \$563 million, having rolled 22 times since it was last hit this past December <u>right here in California</u>.

California Lottery's ticket sales for this two-and-a-half-month jackpot sequence currently total more than \$100 million, and **public schools will earn at least an estimated \$42.4 million** *just from sales of this game alone*. The sole mission of the California Lottery is to generate <u>additional funding for public education</u>. For every \$2 *Mega Millions* ticket sold in California, about 80 cents goes to schools.

In the time since the last *Mega Millions* jackpot was hit, <u>California Lottery retail partners</u> have sold more than 50 million tickets, representing about 15 percent of the total combined sales across the country. *Mega Millions* is played in 45 states, plus the District of Columbia and the U.S. Virgin Islands. Of the 50+ million tickets sold in California, more than 2.1 million have won at various prize levels, earning players a collective \$13.8 million! In addition to the jackpot, there are eight other ways to win *Mega Millions*. The odds of winning any prize are 1 in 24.

If someone hits the jackpot tonight, the estimated cash value of their prize – should a winner decide to take the lump sum payment – is \$265.4 million. If no one wins, the jackpot will roll to an estimated \$607 million for Friday's draw.

The Mega Millions jackpot was hit ten times in 2023 and has yet to be hit so far in 2024.
