Sacramento Powerball® Ticket Set to Expire

Claim or No Claim – When You Play, Schools Win

SACRAMENTO – Nearly 180 days have passed since a *Powerball*® ticket matching five winning numbers – 6, 15, 18, 33, and 49 – was sold by the ARCO ampm gas station on the corner of Marconi Avenue and Eastern Avenue in Sacramento. **The ticket is worth \$1,391,550 and is set to expire just days from now, on Monday, June 16, 2025.**

For now, there's no way of knowing who purchased the winning ticket for the December 18 draw. *Powerball* winners in California who match five numbers have 180 days from the date of the draw to claim their prize. If no one submits a claim in time, **the nearly \$1.4 million prize money will instead be allocated to public schools in California.** The California Lottery exists solely to generate extra money for public education and has raised more than \$1 billion just in unclaimed prizes since Lottery tickets first went on sale in 1985.

Should the winning ticket not be claimed in person or received by the California Lottery with a postmark on or before Monday, the prize funds will be added back to the total funding for California public education. The extra money supports programs at both <u>the high school</u> and <u>community college levels</u>. California Lottery funds provide critical program support, as well as financial assistance to <u>alleviate the material burden for students</u>, <u>enabling them to stay in school</u>.
