JACKPOT! \$515 Million Powerball® Ticket Sold in Anaheim

Orange County 7-Eleven Earns Maximum Bonus of \$1,000,000

SACRAMENTO – There's one lucky California Lottery player who needs to check their tickets this weekend. Someone matched all 5 numbers and the Powerball and has a ticket now worth an estimated \$515 million. Whoever bought it has a year to come forward and claim their prize.

The <u>winning numbers</u> were 21, 7, 11, 61, and 53, and the Powerball was 2. The single winning ticket was sold at the 7-Eleven at 763 North Euclid Street in Anaheim. Thanks to this win, the store earns the maximum bonus of \$1 million!

Saturday's game was the 30th draw since a player in Oregon hit the *Powerball* jackpot in January of this year. The top prize now rolls back to \$20 million for Monday's draw.

Every California Lottery game sold contributes to the Lottery's mission of raising extra money for California's public schools. For every \$2 *Powerball* ticket sold in California, approximately 80 cents goes to education. These funds support a variety of programs across the state. Lottery funding for schools is largely discretionary, so administrators and educators can use Lottery money for instructional programs and services they may not otherwise afford. The California Lottery features eight draw games and dozens of new instant Scratchers games each year. More than 95% of California Lottery sales revenue goes back to the community in the form of prize payments, retailer commissions and bonuses, and contributions to education.
