Mega Millions® Winning Ticket Sold in San Francisco

Mega Millions® Jackpot Still Growing - California Still Winning

SACRAMENTO – While the estimated \$358 million *Mega Millions*® jackpot was not won Tuesday night, one lucky ticket sold by Miss Q's Convenience at 838 Washington Street in San Francisco is worth more than \$2.26 million. The ticket matched five numbers, missing only the Mega Ball. The winning numbers were 6, 43, 52, 64, 65, and 22.

Even when California players don't take home the jackpot, the California Lottery ensures that every play benefits the state's public education system. In fact, since 1985, the Lottery has raised more than more than **\$46 billion for California public schools**, supporting everything from K-12 classrooms to community colleges, UC and CSU campuses.

Ticket Sales Support Schools

The real winners are California students. The Lottery does not rely on taxpayer dollars to operate. Instead, 95 cents of every dollar spent on Lottery tickets is returned to the community in the form of prizes, retailer compensation, and most importantly, contributions to California education.
